Col. Jarrod Frantz is the new commander of the 190th Air Refueling Wing. He assumed command during a ceremony during the April Unit Training Assembly.

Frantz was born and raised in the Topeka area and enlisted in the 190th ARW in August 1985, serving as a crew chief in the 190th Consolidated Aircraft Maintenance Squadron while attending the University of Kansas. In October 1988 he became a boom operator where he logged over 900 hours and was amongst the first crews to deploy in support of Operation Desert Shield.

Since receiving his commission, Frantz has served as 190th Logistics Group Chief of Quality Services,

117th Air Refueling Squadron (ARS) Executive Officer, Element Leader "A" Flight, Commander "A" Flight, 117th ARS Operations Officer and Commander of the 117th ARS. He is a command pilot with more than 4,000 hours in the KC-135 E/D/R aircraft and more than 9,400 total heavy jet hours. He has flown more than 75 combat/combat support sorties totaling more than 460 hours in direct support of Operations Deny Flight, Joint Endeavor, Deliberate Guard, Allied Force, Northern Watch, Iraqi Freedom, Enduring Freedom, New Dawn and Unified Protector.

Submit packages by July 31, with interviews scheduled for Sept. 12-13. Application packages can be sent electronically or via mail. Email submissions must be in PDF single file format, and sent to Maj. Nathan Drewry. The mailing address is:

Qualifications:

1. U.S. citizen
2. Graduate of a four-year college with a bachelor's degree
3. Physically and mentally qualified
4. Height requirement between 64" – 76" (sitting height of 34" – 39")
5. Vision within guidelines set by current directives
6. Must have qualifying AFOQT, TBAS, and PCSM scores
7. Holding a private pilot license is a plus, but not required
8. Pilot candidates should be age 28 or younger during the time of the board
9. Must be able to qualify for a Top Secret level clearance

Applicants must submit the following to be considered for a pilot position:

1. Cover letter - Introduce yourself and explain your desire to join the Air Guard and fly with the 117 Air Refueling Squadron
2. Resume – Complete as for any job application, no specific format required
3. College transcripts – For all educational institutions attended

after high school (i.e junior college, undergraduate and/or post graduate as it applies). Only official transcripts can be accepted

4. Letters of recommendation – Three character reference letters from individuals who can best describe your character and abilities who are not immediate family

5. Pilot license – Include a copy of your license(s) to include all ratings held. An FAA Private Pilot's Certificate (PPC) is not required for application

6. Flight time – If applicable, include documentation of any flight training and time you have accomplished. Copies of the last entries made into your flight log, to include flight totals, are suitable.

7. AFOQT, TBAS, and PCSM Pilot Scores - Minimums required- Verbal: 15 Quantitative: 10 Pilot: 25 PCSM: 10 Contact 190th Air Refueling Wing Base Education & Training Office, 785-861-4132, Anthony.snyder@ang.af.mil, for testing information

8. Physical –If you have a current military physical you may submit it with your application package. Military members are required to submit current physical fitness test scores

9. AF Form 24, Application for Appointment as Reserve of the Air Force. Download at http://static.e-publishing.af.mil/production/1/af_a1/form/af24/af24.xfdl

10. Miscellaneous, Include any letters of appreciation, extracurricular activities, community involvement, prior military record reviews or any other information that may exemplify you above the others. This information is not mandatory, but can help.

What is protected communication?


Air Force Instruction 90-301 "Inspector General for Complaints" defines protected communication as "A communication in which a member of the Armed Forces communicates information that the member reasonably believes evidence a violation of law or regulation, including a law or regulation prohibiting sexual harassment or unlawful discrimination, gross mismanagement, a gross waste of funds or other resources, an abuse of authority or a substantial or specific danger to the public health or

safety, when such a communication is made to any of the following:

1. Member of Congress or a member of their staff.
2. An inspector general (IG) or a member of the inspector general's investigative staff.
3. Personnel assigned to DoD audit, inspection, investigation, law enforcement, equal opportunity, safety, or family advocacy organizations.
4. Any person in the member's chain of command.
5. The Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force, Command Chiefs, Group/

Squadron superintendents, and First Sergeants."



Law day: Magna Carta inspires founding fathers

Law Day is a national day designated to celebrate the rule of law in the United States. President Dwight D. Eisenhower established Law Day in 1958, and in 1961 Congress designated May 1 as the official celebration date.

Each year a theme is selected for Law Day. This year's theme is "Magna Carta: Symbol of Freedom under Law." This year marks the 800-year anniversary of the signing of the Magna Carta. On June 15, 1215, King John signed the Magna Carta in order to prevent a civil war in England. However, Pope Innocent III nullified it 10 weeks later, and the First Barons' War was soon to follow. The Magna Carta was reissued in 1217 by Henry III's regents and by Henry himself when he assumed control of the throne in 1225. English monarchs continued to reissue it upon assuming control of the throne.

Now let us skip forward to 1628. After several English monarchs abused their power, Parliament, led by Sir Edward Coke, sent King Charles I the Petition of Rights. This petition stated that the Crown could not tax subjects without the consent of Parliament, imprison subjects without cause, quarter soldiers on subjects, or implement martial law in peacetime. When the founding fathers prepared the Declaration of Independence, they used the Magna Carta and Petition of Rights as historical precedent. Using Sir Edward Coke's interpretations, the found-

ing fathers believed they had the same rights as Englishmen. In the Declaration of Independence, Thomas Jefferson lists the freedoms that King George III had violated, many of which had been laid out in the Magna Carta.

The founding fathers drew inspiration from the Magna Carta again when they drafted the Bill of Rights. The 39th clause of the Magna Carta states, "No freeman shall be taken, imprisoned, [disseized], outlawed, banished, or in any way destroyed, nor will we proceed against or prosecute him, except by the lawful judgment of his peers or by the law of the land." The Fifth Amendment, which guarantees our right of due process, evolved from this clause.

Although the original Magna Carta failed to prevent war, it was a building block paving the way to the freedom we now enjoy.
